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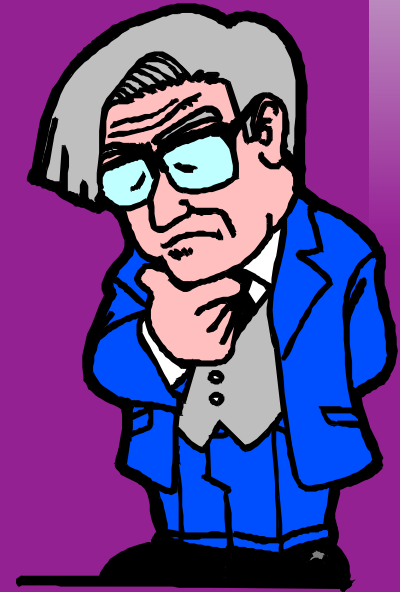
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The Master's Classroom

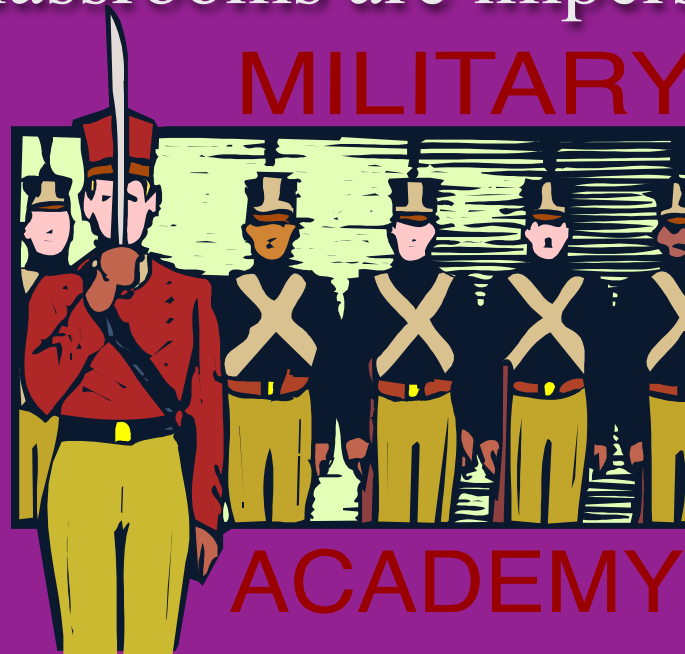
THE OBJECTIVE:

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The Little Red Schoolhouse Model

- ◆ Many students at different levels
- ◆ Much dialogue – little lecture
- ◆ Collaboration on projects
- ◆ Interaction between various levels
- ◆ Flexible grouping
- ◆ Teacher in role of mentor
