

Objectives

- To understand that
 - Teacher must have well-defined objective
 - Nothing is taught unless a student learns
 - Behavioral objective' is a description of a student after instruction

The Importance of a Teaching Objective

A Well Defined Objective

Is the 'cornerstone' of the lesson

 Allows a teacher to know whether a student has learned the lesson



- His stories had an objective
- Every illustration had an objective

Every question He asked had an objective

Every Organization Must Have Targets

Must Have:



- Keeper of the vision
- Mission in mind
- Long-range goals
- Short-term objectives



- First thing a teacher determines
- Must be specific
- Should be written
- Must always be kept in mind as the lesson is taught

The Lesson Objectives Must Be Within the Ability of Students

- 1. Teacher determines the ability of students
- 2. Teacher determines the ability of each student
- 3. Should not be too easy or too hard
- 4. Teacher must not deviate from the lesson objective



- Should be observable to all
- Classroom must reflect
- All lesson material should target
- All illustrations, stories, and audio visual aides should target
